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Introduction

The Singing Europe report on collective singing was published in 2015 as part of the VOICE project (Vision on Innovation for Choral Music in Europe), co-funded by the EU Culture Programme. This report, based on a survey and extensive international research marked the European Choral Association's first major effort to collect both statistical and qualitative data on collective singing across Europe.

Nine years after the original Singing Europe report the European Choral Association has now published "Singing Europe Revisited", an addendum to the original report. During the IGNITE project co-funded by the EU Creative Europe programme (December 2021 to November 2024), the European Choral Association designed a regional development strategy with the aim of strengthening contacts with the collective singing sector especially in Central-Eastern and South-Eastern Europe. The first step was to set up a list of target countries, mostly countries in which the European Choral Association had no member organisation, or one that was not very active. Most of these countries were also "white spots" on the map of the Singing Europe report published in 2015, since it was not possible without local support to gather data from these countries – there was a need for people speaking the language. One important aspect of the regional development work was thus also to try to "fill the gaps" and gather data from the countries which were absent or underrepresented in the original report, or for which there was insufficient data.

It is important to note that the European Choral Association does not currently have sufficient resources to update data for all countries in Europe. We have therefore decided to focus on those countries where data was unavailable or insufficient in the 2015 survey, and where it was possible to find a reliable organisation or person willing to collect data and outline for us the current choral landscape in their country.

Over the past three years, within the framework of the IGNITE project, we have made significant progress. We have successfully established cooperation with several previously under-represented countries. By the end of the third year, we had welcomed several new member organisations in different target countries. We managed to gather new data on choral life in many countries in this region, contributing to a more complete and up-to-date picture of collective singing across Europe.

In the different countries we worked with different types of partners. For one country we used a polling company for an online survey, a similar method we already had tested in two countries for the original Singing Europe data collection. In some countries we were able to reach people on government level or in national institutions supported by the government. Sometimes we had to rely on small private associations or even individual people collecting data as best as they could. The data may therefore not always be as numerical as we had initially hoped and there are often approximate estimates. However, the established collaborations promise to lead to further developments in this area of research within the sector, and the mere fact that we asked our partners for data triggered choral organisations in some countries to start a more thorough data-collection process in the near future. We therefore look forward to more detailed surveys with more precise statistics and data on certain countries to be added in the coming years.

Research Method

A list of countries for which it was not possible to obtain relevant statistical data, and which remained white spots on the map of Singing Europe in 2015, were identified as potential focus areas for our research from 2021 to 2024: Albania, Armenia, Azerbaijan, Belarus*, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Bulgaria, Croatia, Cyprus, Czech Republic, Georgia, Greece, Kosovo, Luxembourg, Malta, Moldova, Montenegro, Portugal, Republic of North Macedonia, Russia*, Serbia, Slovakia, Ukraine*.

* Note: Russia, Belarus and Ukraine were not actively included in the survey due to the ongoing war and related circumstances.

Altogether, we reviewed 19 countries (without Russia, Belarus and Ukraine). Through implementation of the European Choral Association's regional development strategy, we established contacts with organisations and individuals who help shape the choral / collective singing landscape in these regions and invited them to participate in gathering data. We suggested to them to explore three potential alternative approaches:

- Sharing existing data already held by their organisations or by the government in their respective country
- Collecting new data if no relevant data was currently available
- Exploring the option of a professional opinion polling company for data collection

We were interested in the following data:

- 1. Total number of choirs / vocal groups in the country
- All professional choirs where singers are paid and can live from singing
- Amateur choirs of adults over 18 (including church choirs, etc.)
- Amateur children's and youth choirs under 18 (including school choirs, etc.)

- 2. Estimated total number of singers
- 3. Which choir organisations exist at regional and national level in the country

Additionally, since we had used Eurobarometer statistics on singing as a point of reference for the original Singing Europe report, we investigated the possibility of using any updated data they might provide. However, Eurobarometer has not explored this field in recent years.

Furthermore, the original question used by Eurobarometer was "Have you sung in the last 12 months?". This was understood very differently in different countries, so that sometimes more people answered this question with "yes" than the assumed total number of people practicing collective singing (because there are people who sing privately but do not join a choir or ensemble), and astonishingly enough in some countries fewer people answers the Eurobarometer question with "yes", which could be connected to a different interpretation of the question.

We recommended at the time that Eurobarometer consider including a question on collective singing activities in future surveys and hope that such a question could then be asked in a more precise way, for instance in the form: "do you regularly sing together with others?" or "have you regularly sung together with others?" or even "have you regularly sung together with others in a choir or ensemble?".

There is currently no official data available on the choral sector in Armenia. The Armenian Choral Organisation has expressed its willingness to collect precise data in the future, though this will require significant time and effort. In the meantime, the data presented here is based on insights provided by conductor Marine Alavedyan, offering an approximate snapshot of the sector at this moment.

Church Choirs

- Estimated Number: Approximately 20 church choirs.
- Compensation: Singers and conductors receive a minimum salary from the church.

State Choirs

- Estimated Number: 6–7 professional state choirs.
- Compensation: Singers and conductors earn a living wage.

Cultural Houses Founded by Churches

- Estimated Number: Around 15 Cultural Houses founded by Churches operate children's choirs.
- Compensation: Only conductors are paid; participation is free for singers.

Non-Professional Choirs

• Estimated Number: About 15 amateur choirs operating independently, without payment for conductors.

Music Schools & Colleges

- Estimated Number of Participants: 2500–3000 children involved in choral singing.
- Participation Requirement: Participation is mandatory for students in these institutions.

General Education School Choirs

• Estimated Number of Participants: Approximately 600–800 students participate in school choirs, although these are not widespread.

Total Estimated Number of Choir Singers

• Approximately 4,500 singers actively participate in choirs across Armenia.

- 10.8% (54 people) sangless than once a month, reflecting occasional involvement.
- On the other hand, a large majority, 85.7% (429 people), stated that they never participated in such activities during the past year.

Demographics of choral singers Gender:

Women are slightly more involved in choral singing than men:

- 12.3% of women sing in a choir less than once a month, compared to 9.2% of men.
- 4.5% of women participate more than once a month, while only 2.3% of men do so.
- A higher percentage of men (88.5%) reported never participating, compared to 83.2% of women.

Age:

Young adults (16-24 years) are the most involved in choral singing:

• 9.4% sing less than once a month, and 2.2% more than once a month, while 78.4% never participated.

Adults aged 45-54 years also show notable participation:

• 1.2% of this group sing more than once a month, the highest of any age group.

The 55+ group has the highest proportion of individuals who never participate (90.2%), indicating a drop in choral involvement with age.

In summary, women and younger people are more engaged in choral activities, while men and older adults participate less.

This data is based on a public opinion poll conducted by Hendal d.o.o., involving a relevant sample group of 500 people.

In Cyprus, choral singing is primarily supported by local municipalities and NGOs. Many municipalities fund children's and adult choirs, some are also part of NGOs that can apply for financial support from the Ministry of Culture. Additionally, church choirs and children's choirs affiliated with private conservatories contribute to the choral scene. Most singers are amateurs, led by professional conductors.

It can be estimated that approximately 1.9% of the population of the Czech Republic sings in a choir.

The calculation was based on the National Information and Consulting Centre for Culture (NIPOS) questionnaire survey with a sample of 105 choirs of all ages and the below rough estimate of the number of choirs.

Additional information on the data provided by NIPOS

The exact number of choirs in the Czech Republic is currently not available. Since 2021, the National Information and Consulting Centre for Culture (NIPOS) has started to systematically map the choirs in the Czech Republic, but this activity is not yet complete.

The National Choir Database published at www.nsdb.cz documents 1262 active choirs in the Czech Republic as of 1 May 2024, but they assume that the actual number will be at least twice as many. Therefore, with the help of statisticians, they have made a rough estimate based on the data in the publication Singing Europe, 2015. For this estimate, a reference group of three Central and Eastern European countries with similar socio-economic backgrounds was created: Poland, Romania and Hungary. The estimate does not take into account qualitative factors such as a country's background for choral singing or choral singing traditions. The definition of the term "choir" may also be problematic, as it may be understood in different cultural contexts in different ways (in some countries it may include, for example, folk singing groups as well). It can therefore be assumed that this estimate may be an overestimate in the context of Czech choral singing.

Until now, a conservative estimate by NIPOS has been approximately 3000-4000 active choral ensembles. However, detailed empirical evidence is not available at this time.

Notes on the data

The data presented above reflect an important part of the choral activity in Greece. The statistical data has been compiled from active choirs across the country by the Hellenic Choir Association. It is important to note that many additional choirs exist within schools, churches and small cultural centres. However, due to their non-participation in cultural events and public performances, relevant data from these groups could not be collected. Furthermore, the COVID-19 pandemic has impacted the choral landscape, resulting in the creation of new choirs and the dissolution of others. The Hellenic Association of Choirs will continue to carry out research and to collect and update data.

Based on the provided data, the estimated total number of singers across all listed choirs in Macedonia ranges from approx. 4000 - 7000 singers. This number represents about 0.38% of the total population.



Current situation

There are no detailed data on amateur choirs in Malta. There are a number of project and church choirs in the choral field, and singers are often paid to participate in religious festivals, especially in the summer. There is one statefunded choir, but even this is project-based and does not offer full-time employment. Many choirs share a limited pool of singers, so there is overlap in the membership of different groups.

Our research has contributed to an initiative to carry out a study on amateur choirs in Malta, which is expected to produce results in late 2025 or early 2026.

The research on the choral scene in Montenegro was conducted as part of the project "Affirmation of Cultural Expressions in Montenegro," initiated by the Ministry of Culture in 2019. The study, titled "Analysis of the State, Needs, and Conditions for the Development of Amateur Cultural and Artistic Creativity," was coordinated by NGO Vox mirus, which was a partner in this project, with the participation of key collaborators for the filed of vocal music: Andrijana Vučetić Obadović, M.Sc., Milena Vrzić, M.Sc. and Mirjana Živković.

The project began in December 2019 and was completed by the end of 2020. A total of 70 responses were collected. These responses included:

- 25 Vocal Ensembles/Claps/Singing Groups/Vocal Groups
- 27 Choir Ensembles (secular and religious)
- 13 Fiddle Societies
- 5 Orchestras

The majority of respondents were amateur choirs, both secular and religious, reflecting a strong tradition of community-based singing in Montenegro. The research confirmed the absence of a professional choral ensemble in Montenegro, which limits professional development opportunities in the field.

In the absence of a central register of choirs in Slovakia, the SATB.sk portal initiated its own data collection by designing and launching an online questionnaire.

A total of 179 choirs participated in the census, answering approximately 29 questions about various aspects of their activities. While this number does not represent the total number of choirs in Slovakia (and we are aware that more choirs exist), the results offer an approximate overview of the current state of choral life in the country.

Conclusion

Through the survey, we aimed to reach out to organisations and individuals in all 19 countries through the implementation of the European Choral Association's regional development strategy. We succeeded in most countries. This does not mean that we were able to collect relevant data from every one of these countries, but it was certainly an incentive for all involved to do so in the future. Two countries, Luxembourg and Malta, are in the middle of national surveys and will be able to provide data in 2025. Unfortunately, despite initial interest shown by our contacts in these countries, we have not been able to obtain data for Bosnia and Herzegovina, nor have we received responses from Azerbaijan and Portugal.

However, we successfully collected data of differing quality from 14 countries in total.

- For some countries, like Albania, Armenia, Montenegro, Georgia, Kosovo, and Moldova, data were collected and shared for the first time. This put these countries on the European choral map and gave a big boost to their national collective singing communities and the wider European choral family.
- A key strength for us is that the data were collected with the help of local conductors, choir managers, and organisations directly in the field. This added valuable insights into choral / collective singing activities across Europe.
- We also conducted a professional public opinion survey with a
 polling company in Croatia, a country for which we had not received
 any data for the 2015 Singing Europe report and where it was clear
 that our member organisations would not be able to provide
 sufficient data.

- Some countries, like Slovakia and the Czech Republic, were inspired by the Singing Europe study to do their own detailed research. In the Czech Republic, NIPOS used the Singing Europe project as a model to collect more specific data about choirs. In Slovakia, for the first time, data about the singing community were gathered using a national online survey.
- In Malta and Bulgaria, our research sparked interest in carrying out their own studies on choral life in the country. Malta is already in the implementation phase, while Bulgaria has put this in the medium-term plan. This shows a growing understanding of the importance of collecting good data about collective singing, though these efforts are still in the planning stage. Luxembourg is already working on its study and plans to share results with the European Choral Association in 2025.

We are deeply grateful to all the individuals who counted the choirs, contacted colleagues, wrote questionnaires and carried out surveys of various kinds, so that they could provide us with data and thus contribute a piece to the mosaic of the European collective singing landscape. Many of them did this as volunteer work and with a lot of dedication, for which we have enormous appreciation.
